



Our Research Seminars

Our April seminar featured two presentations on the findings from the second Just Sayin' Survey of young people who are eligible for a transition support worker.

Just Sayin' has been developed as a survey to hear the voices of rangatahi about how they are being supported, what difference the support has made for them, and to understand their living situations.
