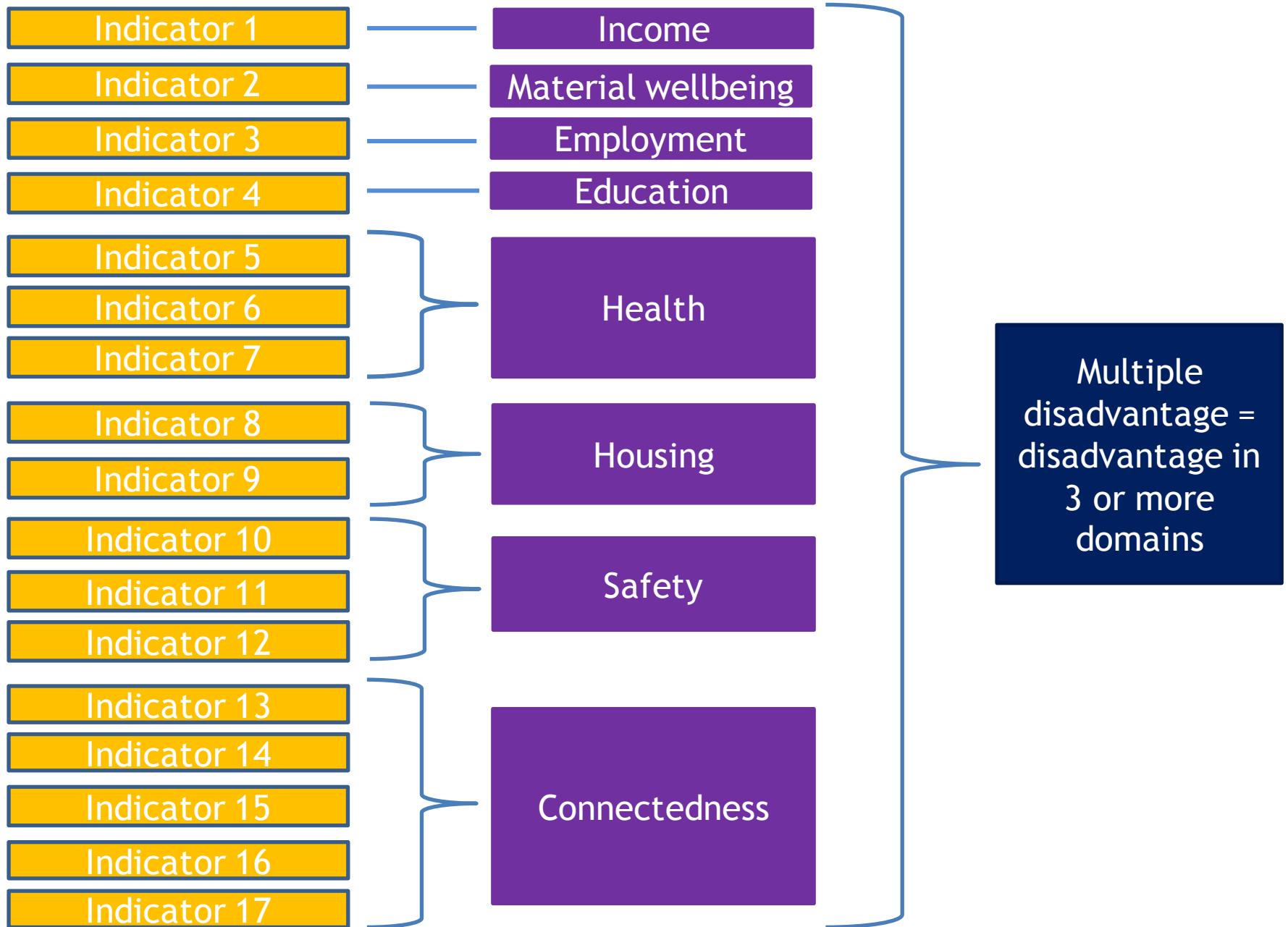


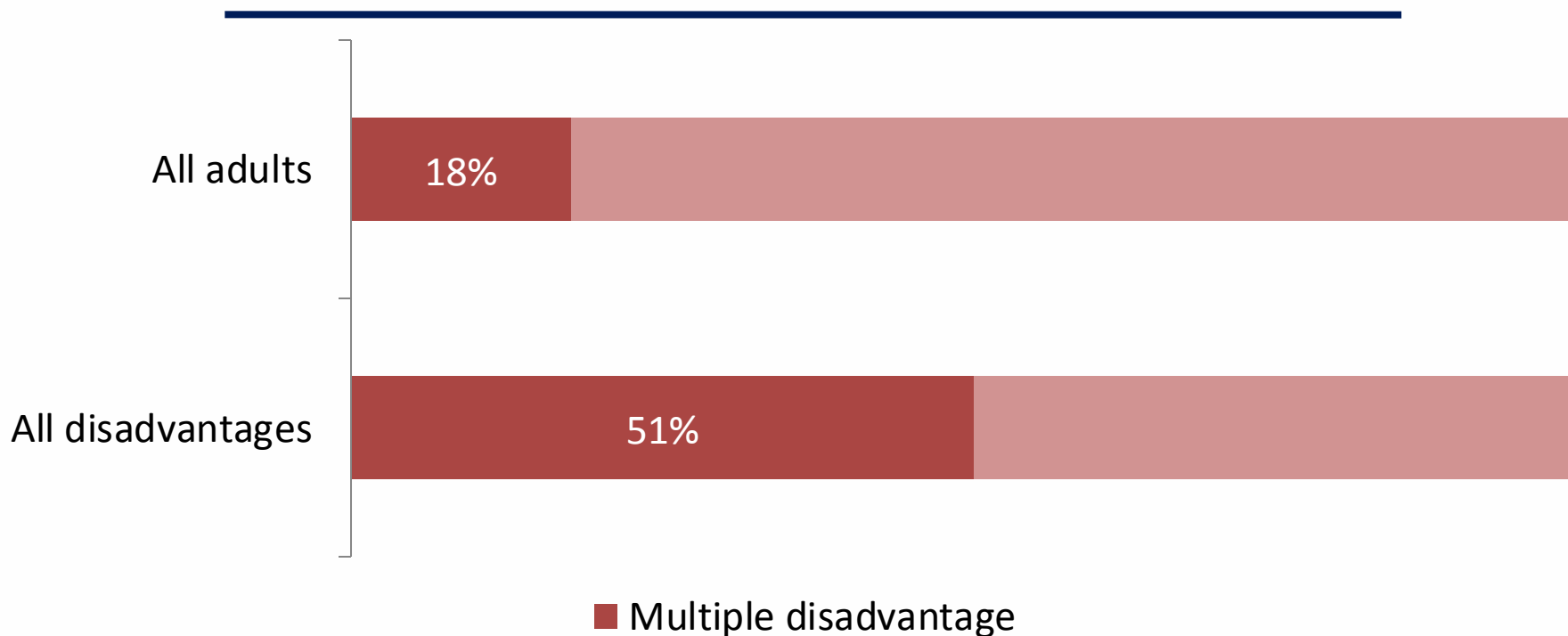

Figure 4_ Average government expenditure for respondents to the 2014 General Social Survey in the 12 months after the survey, by number domains in disadvantage

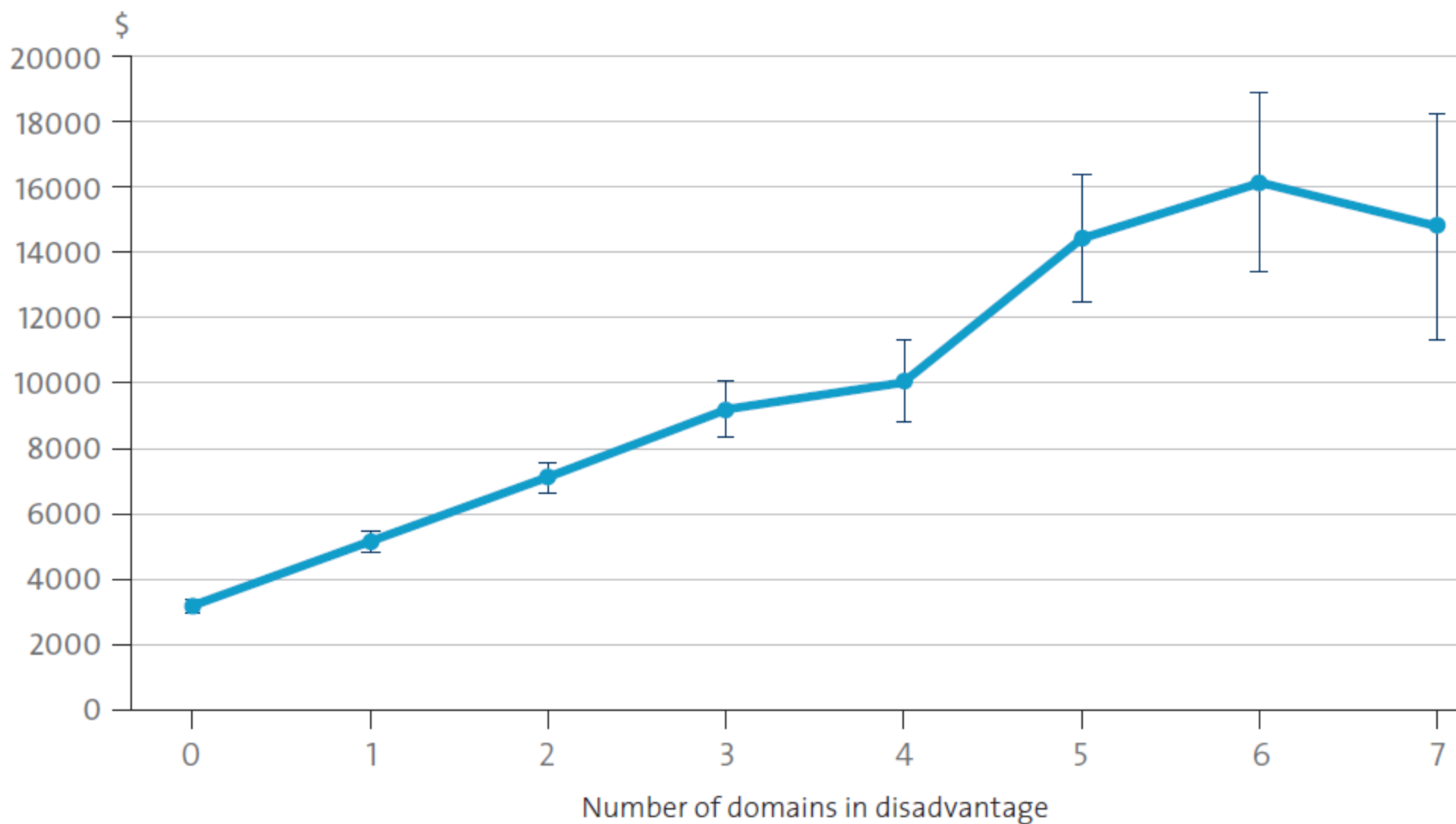
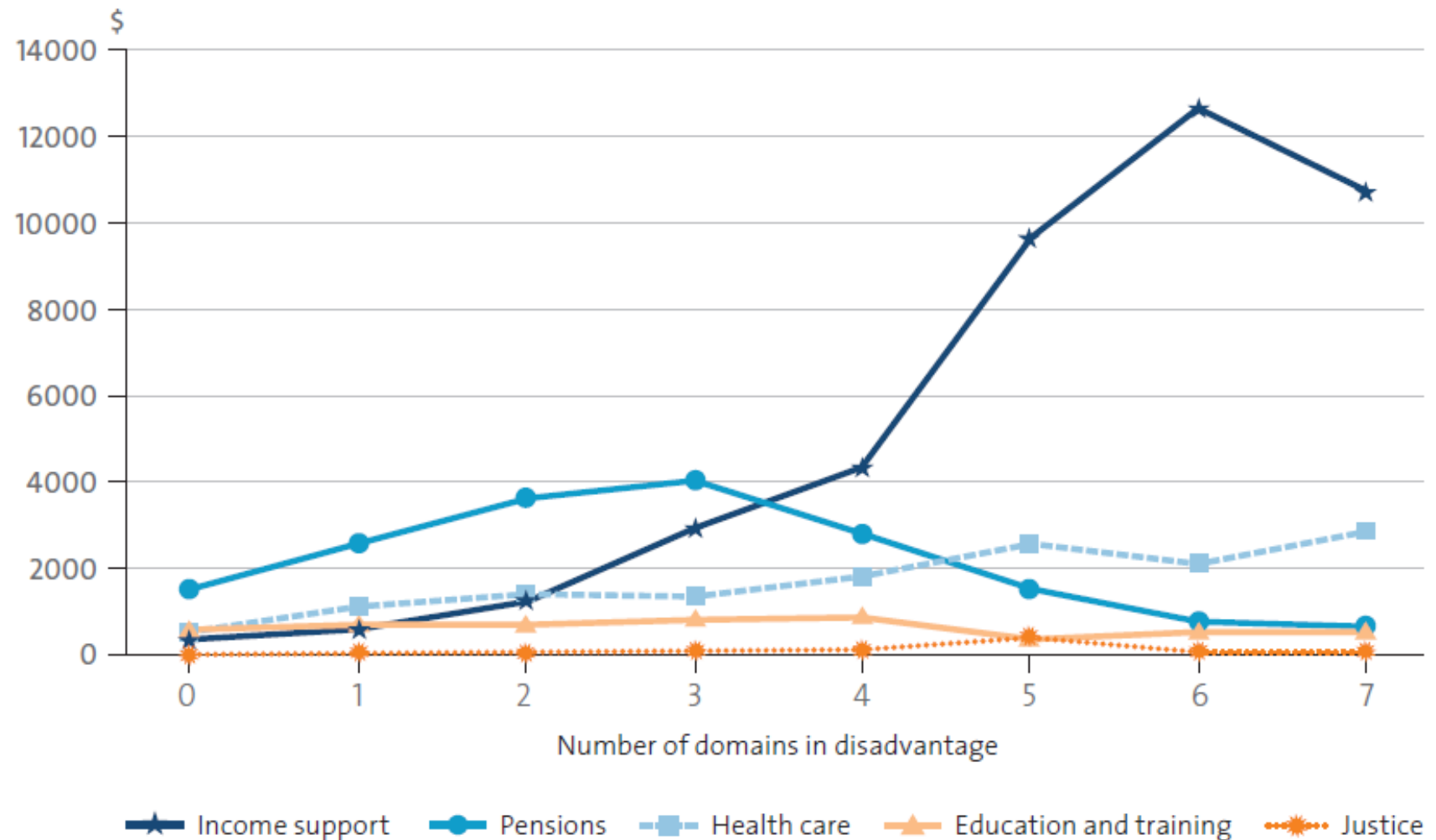


Figure 5 _ Average government expenditure by area for respondents to the 2014 General Social Survey in the 12 months after the survey, by number domains in disadvantage

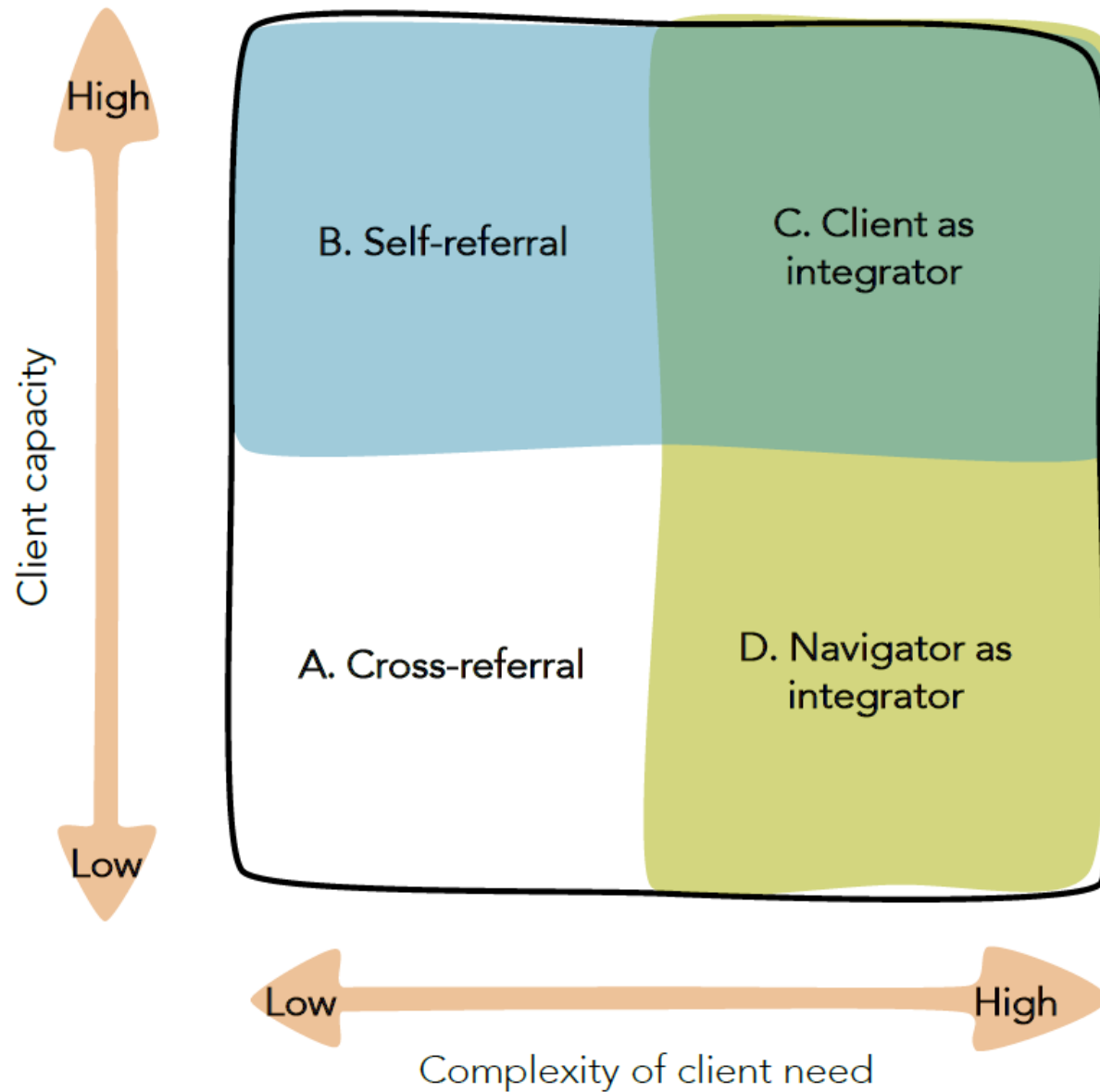

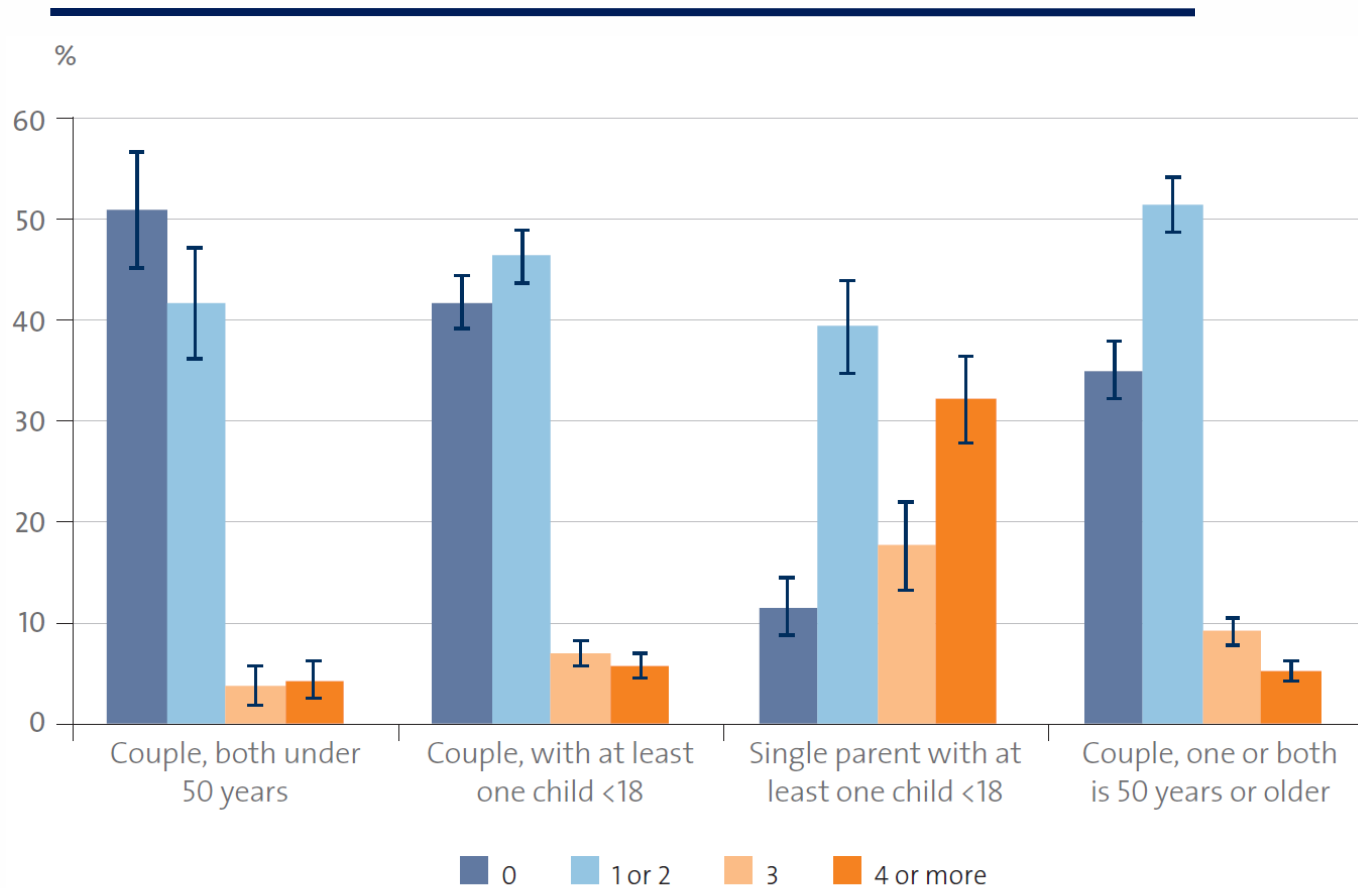

Prevalence of domain disadvantage faced by families with multiple disadvantage (three or more domains in disadvantage)

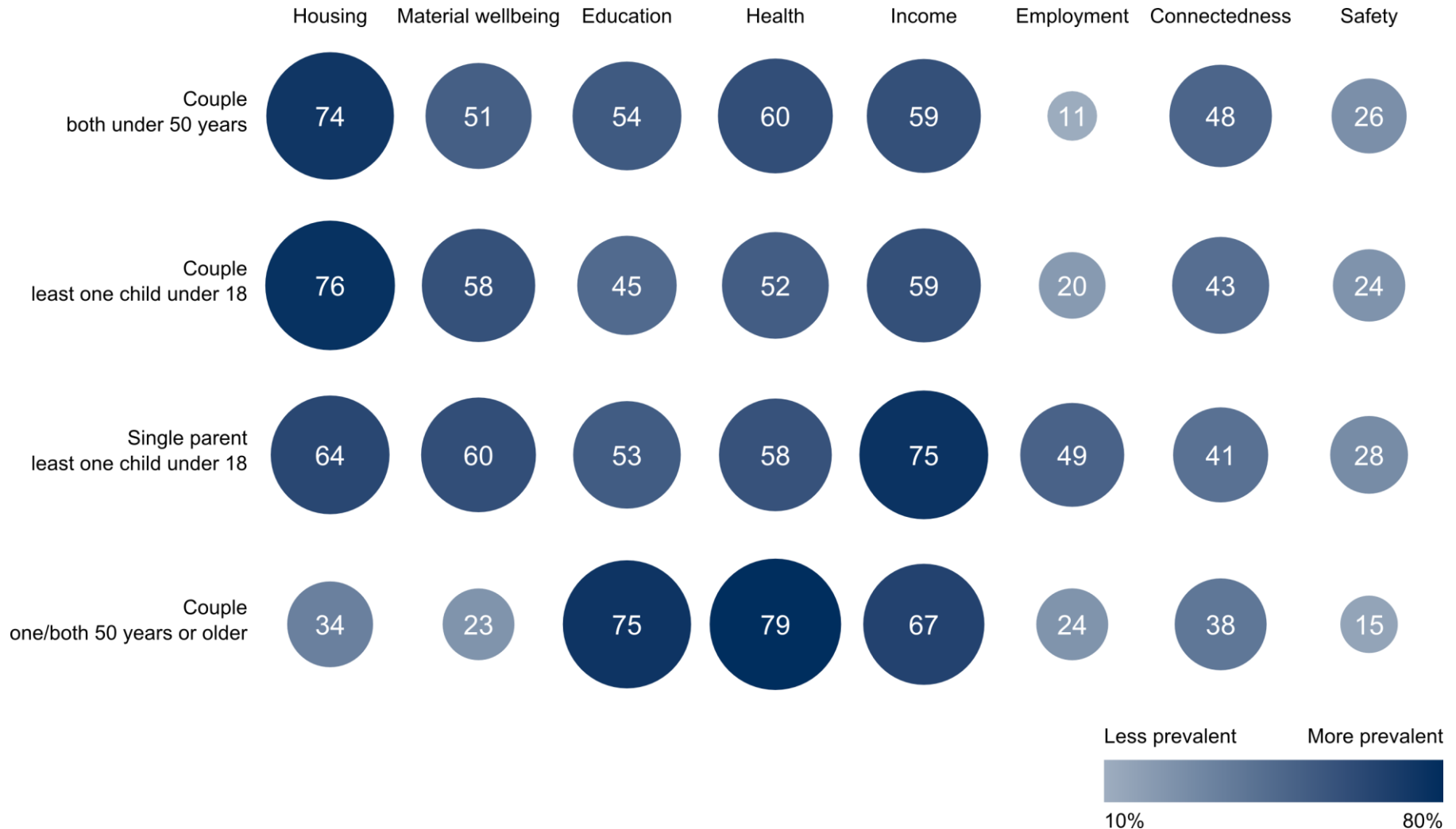
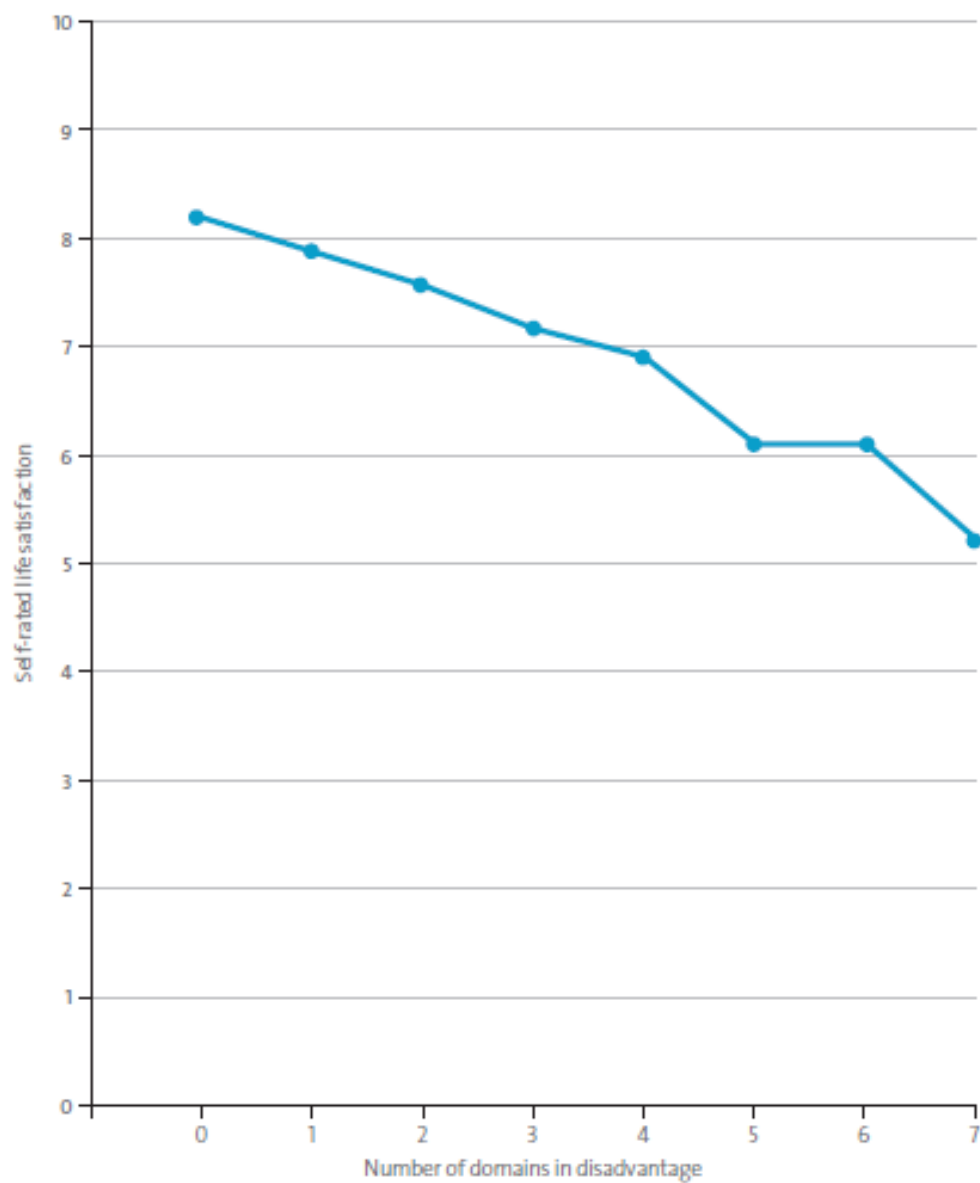


Figure 5_ Average life satisfaction score, by number of domains in disadvantage
